Mamie Sample Eggleston Dunn, age 98, died July 31, 2007, at her home in Yazoo City, Mississippi. Private burial services were held at Glenwood Cemetery at 9:30 a.m., Thursday, August 2. Visitation was held at First Presbyterian Church Chapel from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. A memorial service in the sanctuary, conducted by Pastor Joe Easterling, followed visitation.

Mrs. Dunn is survived by one son, Charles Marshall Dunn III and wife Beverly of Brandon, Mississippi; three daughters, Marsha Dunn Williams of Yazoo City, Mississippi, Trudy Dunn Gallo and husband Art of Pawleys Island, South Carolina, Anna Catherine Dunn Ferguson and husband H.T. (Buddy) of Baton Rouge, Louisiana; seven grandchildren, Phil Williams and Missie George of Yazoo City, Mississippi, Mamie Williams of Lincoln Park, Michigan, Chas Dunn of Brandon, Mississippi, Rebekah Ferguson of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, Tom Sewell Rand of Rockville, Maryland, and Marsha Raines of Westminster, Maryland; and five great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Dunn was predeceased by her husband, Charles Marshall (Duck) Dunn, Jr.; one sister, Gertrude Eggleston, and three brothers, Charles M., Tom E., and R. Tyler Eggleston.

Descended from early settlers of Yazoo County, she was the granddaughter of Henry Clay Tyler, who built and gave the town clock on the Yazoo County Court House. Her grandmother, Cornelia Cusack Tyler, born in 1834, was the first Caucasian child born in Yazoo City (Manchester).

Active for many years in the First Presbyterian Church, she was the oldest member, having been baptized in 1910 and making a profession of faith in 1920. She was instrumental in starting the church library and was a founding member of the Yazoo Art Association. She maintained a membership in the Yazoo Chapter, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution.
